Dave Cooke



In 1990 Dave Cooke and his wife Gill, after seeing the terrible images of Romanian orphans on the television, decided to do something about it and with the help of friends and family put together aid wagons ready to drive across Europe. They hoped the medical supplies, beds, blankets and clothes would radically change the horrific conditions in which these children were living. What they didn't know (and noone knew) was that the few thousand shoebox gifts that went across with the convoy from Wrexham would grow into the biggest shoebox programme in the world! Operation Christmas Child was born.

In 1994 Operation Christmas Child was amalgamated with the American led International Charity Samaritan's Purse. Dave resigned from his job as Contracts Manager for a Window Installation company and became Overseas Projects Manager, delivering shoeboxes all across the world whilst developing their soccer programme & Second Chance programme; taking sports and games to street children and juvenile convicts. From those years pioneering new programmes and visiting new countries grew the seeds for Teams4U.

Dave founded Teams4U in 2006 after experiencing the atrocities of the Beslan crisis when over 300 people were killed in a school attack in Russia. In 2014 after years of being asked repeatedly to do shoeboxes again he agreed and relaunched the shoebox program as it was originally.

In 2017 Dave was recognised for his invaluable contributions to international charity work by being presented with an honorary doctorate from Salford University.

Teams4u Lesson Plan Ideas

Teams4u have worked together with teachers to come up with ideas that can be used to incorporate shoeboxes into the national curriculum. If you have any other ideas we would love to hear from you!

Geography: National Curriculum for Key Stage One.

Aim: Understand geographical similarities and differences through studying the human and physical geography of a small area of the United Kingdom, and of a small area in a contrasting Eastern European country.

Task: Children could compare similarities and differences between where they live and where the shoeboxes are going to be delivered (looking at those being delivered to Eastern Europe such as Romania or Belarus).

Human and physical geography

Aim: Identify seasonal and daily weather patterns in the United Kingdom and the location of hot and cold areas of the world in relation to the Equator and the North and South Poles.

Aim: Use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to:

Key physical features: Beach, cliff, coast, forest, hill, mountain, sea, ocean, river, soil, valley, vegetation, season and weather.

key human features: City, town, village, factory, farm, house, office, port, harbour and shop.

Task: Teachers could set a research project to find out about the country where they are going to be delivered, looking at the different physical and human features. Children could research using the internet, using Google images to compare and contrast the different locations.

Geographical skills and fieldwork:

Aim: Use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the United Kingdom and its countries, as well as the countries, continents and oceans studied at this key stage.



Task: Map work to find the different countries where the shoeboxes are delivered. Belarus, Bosnia, Ukraine, Romania.

Aim: Use simple compass directions (north, south, east and west) and locational and directional language [for example, near and far, left and right], to describe the location of features and routes on a map.

Task: Use aerial photographs and plan perspectives to recognise landmarks and basic human and physical features; devise a simple map; and use and construct basic symbols in a key. The aerial photographs used could be from the different locations.

Maths:

Task: Explore a range of Christmas wrapping paper and look at the patterns. Can you talk about and describe the patterns you can see? Design and make your own wrapping paper to cover a shoebox.

Task: Use the 'Bulk Buy Box' sheet as an idea/starting point to select items for the shoebox and work out how much it would cost. If I only had £4.50 what could I buy?

Fundraising task:

Organise a fundraising event where the children plan and carry out the event. Depending on what they do they can relate it to money, sharing quantities etc. They could design posters (Art & Literacy) to advertise the event. (I have done this on many occasions when we raised money to sponsor an animal – my class of 4 and 5 year olds made a lot of biscuits and sold them to the rest of the school! We made money and the children certainly knew what a 20p looked like by the end of the event). These are always very successful activities which motivate the children and provide real life and purposeful opportunities for them.



How To Fill Your Shoebox

- **1. Use our Flat-pack OR Find an empty shoebox** Preferably medium size. If needed, wrap the lid and the box separately in Christmas paper.
- 2. Boy, girl or home? Choose who you'd like your box to go to and fill out the label. Please stick to the front of your shoebox lid. Additional labels can be downloaded from our website if needed.
- 3. Personalise your shoebox Take a look at the list of gift ideas in this booklet. More ideas are also available online. Please DO NOT include: Food (only exception is sweets), medicines, military themed items (such as toy soldiers/tanks/guns), aerosols or anything highly flammable, sharp items, novels.
- 4. Make your donation Please complete the attached form at the bottom of this page and enclose it in the envelope, provided along with the recommended donation of £3.00 and place inside your shoebox.
- 5. Drop off your shoebox Please close your box with an elastic band and take to your nearest collection point. Please remember to check the collection dates in your local area.

Group Shoebox Project

It sometimes can be difficult for individuals to make complete shoebox gifts but the below guide shows how a group of 20 can make at least 4 boxes between them without spending more than £2* each, assuming all donate 50p alongside the item you ask them to bring in:

Group Shoebox Project

BEFORE YOU BUY – have you looked around the house?

Hygiene:

- 1. Toothpaste –free from 'Designed to Smile' schemes.
- Toothbrushes as above.
- 3. Soap/small toiletries unwanted gift.
- 4. Combs/Hairbrushes/ Hair accessories –donated as unwanted gifts/party favours

Educational:

- 1. Pencils/erasers/pens— donated from party bags, unwanted gifts, simply lying around the house.
- 2. Sharpeners –from party bags, not needed stationery gift sets/art sets etc.
- 3. Paper An extra exercise book from a school multi-pack, pullout sheets from a colouring book, or 5-10 sheets from a ream of printer paper.

Fun:

- 1. Toys 1 good condition second-hand toy.
- 2. Balloons/stickers/party bag favours

Practical:

1. Hat, scarf, glove set – unwanted gift or good condition second-hand.

Other:

1. Sweets – [in-date by March the following year] from home multi-pack, party bags, leftovers or extra from Halloween/birthday parties.

We all want to make a beautiful gift for a child overseas, so here are some tricks to keep your gift from breaking the bank...


- 1. See what items you have at home that you no longer need.
- 2. Anybody Knit? See if you or somebody you know can knit Hand Puppets Hats, Scarves & mittens.
- 3. Look for local/clearance sales.
- 4. Check out your budget stores. You can pick up many toys for £1 or less, plus the occasional stationery set for 19p at Home Bargains!
- 5. Buy multi-packs of party fillers e.g. £1 for 6 bouncy balls in Asda or £1 for 6 tubes of bubbles in The Works.
- 6. Got some unused pens/pencils/erasers/sharpener? Simply wrap with an elastic band.
- **7.** Add Freebies from magazines, prizes from kid's parties, leftover balloons/stickers, good quality pre-loved soft, toy/car, unused Stationery, unused toiletries.
- 8. Buy supermarket basics range: e.g. toothpaste from Tesco's/Sainbury's at 50p.
